Autumn Statement promises better support for people with multiple needs

The Making Every Adult Matter (MEAM) coalition [1] has welcomed today's commitment in the Autumn Statement to better support people facing multiple needs [2].

The government has confirmed that it wants to extend the principles underpinning the Troubled Families programme – which incentivises local areas to take coordinated action for families with multiple problems - to other groups of individuals with multiple needs.

The announcement follows the publication of the government's Service Transformation Challenge Panel report [3], last week.

In October, **Baroness Tyler of Enfield, Chair of the MEAM coalition**, called for a national focus on multiple needs in a House of Lords debate on Social Justice, saying that:

"Government could help to change the national finance and outcomes structures that so often pull services apart rather than pushing them together. By taking the best bits of the Troubled Families programme and combining it with a really strong input from the voluntary sector, a new 'troubled families for individuals' programme could make significant cost savings over the course of the next Parliament."

Oliver Hilbery, Director at the MEAM coalition, said:

"We welcome the announcement in today's Autumn Statement. As our work with local areas shows [4], coordinated services at the local level can improve lives, increase wellbeing and reduce costs.

"While the detail of any plans will be important, there is potential for a national programme to develop the accountability, finance and outcomes structures that can actively help local services to work better together.

"We look forward to working closely with the government as these plans are developed."
